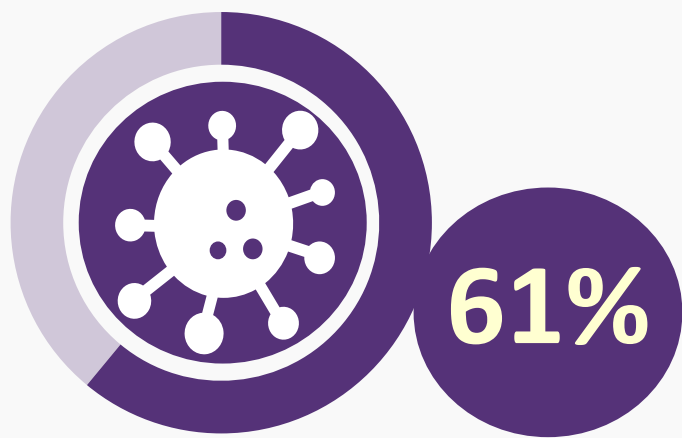


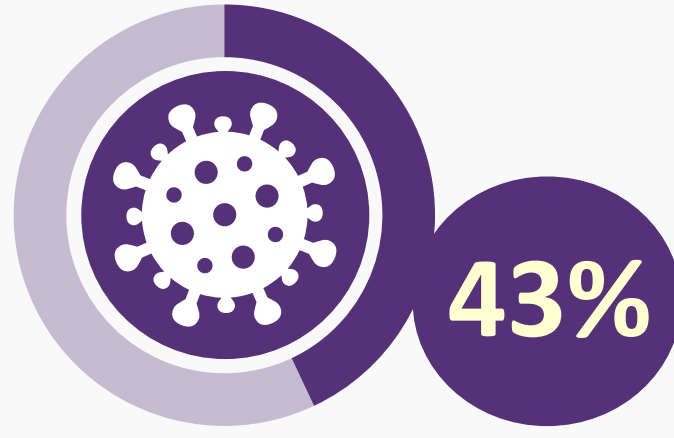
Less than two-thirds of adults with diagnosed HIV were screened for syphilis and less than half were screened for chlamydia and gonorrhea during routine HIV care appointments.

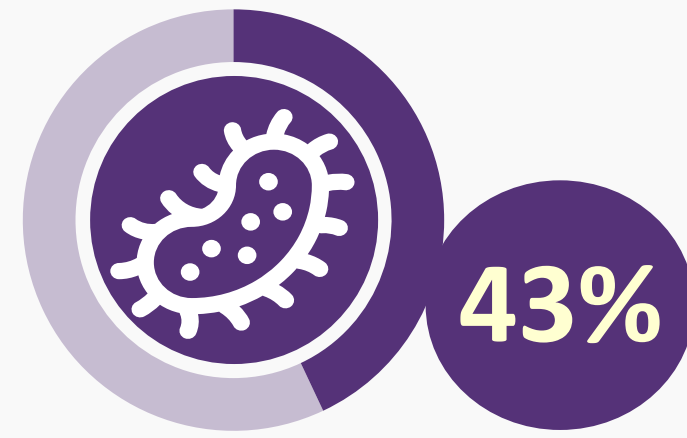
Screening for Sexually Transmitted Infections



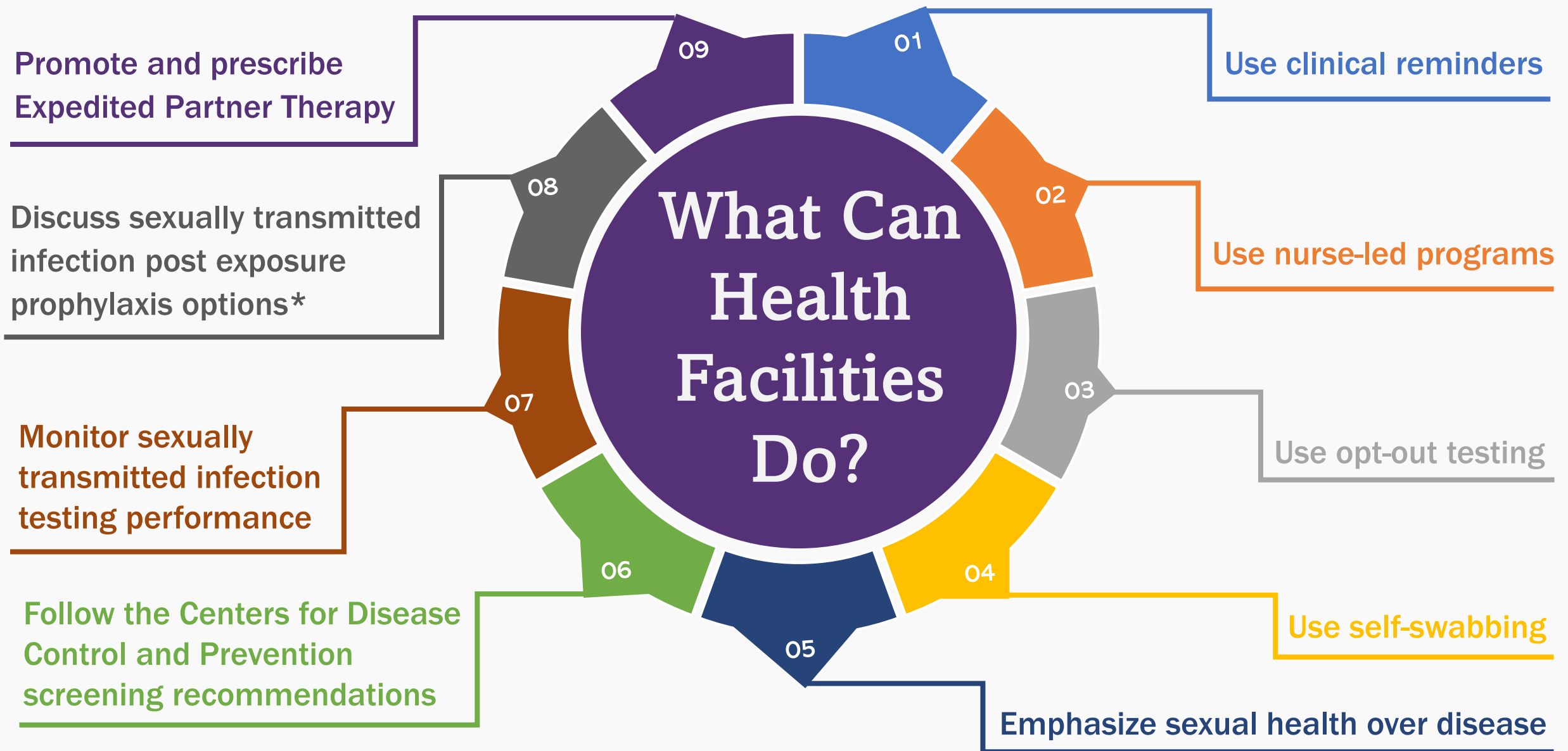
Syphilis

MMP is an expanded HIV surveillance project led by state, local, and territorial health departments in partnership with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Limitations: Data on testing for sexually transmitted infections were collected via medical record abstraction at the HIV care facility and does not capture testing that may have occurred outside of this setting; percentages are based on sexually transmitted infection testing done during the 12 months before interview.

Recommendation: At minimum, annual sexually transmitted infection testing is recommended for individuals with diagnosed HIV.
