Addressing the burden of cancer in communities across New York State

Overview

In collaboration with the New York State (NYS) Cancer Consortium, the NYS Department of Health funded 16 organizations to conduct small community projects in support of the [NYS Comprehensive Cancer Control Plan](#) (Plan). The Plan recommends statewide and local interventions in seven priority areas across the cancer continuum. Funded projects addressed skin cancer prevention, human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine promotion, cancer survivorship, and colorectal cancer screening.

Community Projects

- Host an educational event about the need for colorectal cancer screening
- Create personal story videos or public service announcements (PSAs) to promote colorectal cancer screening
- Host an educational event for healthcare professionals to promote the HPV vaccine as cancer prevention
- Install sunscreen dispensers
- Host an educational event for health educators, patient navigators, cancer patients, and caregivers about available cancer treatment options and how to advocate for quality care
- Host an educational event for primary care providers about how to better understand and care for cancer survivors in the primary care setting

About the PSAs

Colorectal Cancer Screening PSAs in Spanish

- 1) Upstate Cancer Center developed a PSA featuring a Spanish-speaker to promote colorectal cancer screening in the Hispanic community with an emphasis on the importance of screening, risk factors, and how to receive an at-home stool test kit.

- 2) Huntington Hospital developed an all-Spanish PSA presented by Dr. David Rivadeneira, the Director of the Cancer Institute at Huntington Hospital, and a bilingual colorectal cancer surgeon. The PSA, shared with numerous community partners, highlights the risk of colorectal cancer among Hispanics and encourages patients to speak to their doctor about getting screened.



Types of Clinical Trials (treatment)

- Three different types of clinical trials
- 三種不同的臨床研究治療
- Phase I: If the results of laboratory studies of a possible treatment are promising, it will enter into a phase I study to assess for safety
- 第一階段：如果一種研究治療的實驗室研究結果顯示有希望，這項治療將會進入第一階段以評估其安全性
- Phase II: Once safety of the drug is known, then it will move on a phase II to assess for efficacy
- 第二階段：如果確認了這種藥物安全性，它會進入第二階段，以評估它的功效
- Phase III: Compare the safety and effectiveness of the new treatment against the current standard treatment
- 第三階段：將新的治療方式的的安全性和有效性與目前使用的標準治療進行對比
